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## A Message from Our Pastor

hat a joy and privilege it was to worship with you all last weekend at Oak Hills. It is such an honor and privilege to be able to serve as your pastor and I look forward to seeing what God does among us.

As I come to this first newsletter, I thought I would spend some time sharing a little of my story with you, including my testimony and my call into ministry.

I grew up as the oldest child of three in central Indiana. I was a good student. I ran on the cross country and track teams and played the saxophone in the high school band. From a young age, I was interested in questions of theology. I enjoyed

going to church, loved confirmation, and listened almost exclusively to Christian music. In spite of all this, I never fully understand what it really meant to be a Christian.

It March of 1998, my senior year in high school, I attended Acquire the Fire, a Christian youth conference, with my church youth group. The speaker talked about Jesus' desire to burn our dead branches in the fire of God's love. I felt like I had a lot of dead branches in my life at that time. The message touched me deeply and so when the altar call was given, I accepted Jesus as my Savior.

The following fall, I started college at the University of Evansville with majors in Archaeology, Biblical Studies and Classics. My dream was to find the chariots in the Red Sea. It was during college that my Christian walk really began to grow. My Bible classes and my participation in the Christian groups on campus were instrumental in establishing my beliefs, my understanding of Scripture, and my practice.

Following my freshman year, I had a spinal fusion. I had been diagnosed with scoliosis in one of the random screenings at school in the fourth grade. Finally, it had progressed enough that surgery was deemed to be necessary. It was during recovery that I began to sense God's call into ministry. I resisted it for about 6 months, but during that time I spoke to friends, my mentor, my

pastors, and my teacher. It became clear that God was speaking. I recall one story that my mom had never told me before. Prior to my birth, she had 2 miscarriages. She was devastated, thinking her chances of ever having a child were slim. So, she began to pray Hannah's prayer—that if God would only giver her a child, she would dedicate him to the Lord. She went on to share that when I went into that operating room, she gave me to God. The timing of my sense of call and that act of surrender by my mom was too much of a coincidence to ignore. So, I said yes to the call and headed off to seminary at Emory University.

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Doors began to close in the Lutheran Church, and I remembered how my mentor, who had passed away a few months earlier, said I would make a good teacher. I redefined my sense of call and began to pursue ministry in the college arena. I pursued doctoral studies at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School and ultimately took a position as an adjunct teaching Bible at Olivet Nazarene University. I taught there three years, but when I began to apply for full time positions, every place I applied wanted ministry experience. That led me to pursue ministry in the United Methodist Church. At first my plan was to return to teaching, but God had other plans. I sensed that this was where I was supposed to be, so I dropped out of the Ph.D.

program and gave myself fully to the call to serve God in the life of the church.

I look forward to this next phase in ministry and getting to know you all a little better. I hope that you will take advantage of one of the meet the pastor opportunities coming up in the next few weeks. This is a great way for us to get to know each other and for me to hear the heartbeat and pulse of the church.

## **Opening Our Spirit Ears in God's Creation**

# Jesus left there and went along the Sea of Galilee. Then he went up on a mountainside and sat down. (Matthew15:29)

s I am writing this, my kitchen is covered with boxes and bags as we pack up for our annual Fourth of July trek to Cumberland Falls State Park in the Appalachian Mountains for the Spencer Family Reunion. The family has been doing this for nearly 50 years and Alan and his cousins are now the senior generation. We


reserve a circle of cabins and each family has one, and we do community meals at supper. Alan and I have not been for three years due to Covid and my surgery, and all our boys and grands will be there. In addition to the 70 plus family members it is good to spend some time in the woods, hike to Cumberland Falls, and enjoy vistas of the beautiful Cumberland River.

There is something about nature that can help us relax and also open up our relationship with God. Here are some ways this can happen.

God's creation stirs an attitude of awe and praise. This is easy to see with the vast expanse of the ocean or the majesty of the mountains, but it can work in our back yard too. Look at the trees, feel the breeze through the leaves, smell the flowers, see the colors of the blossoms and the grass, notice the intricate weave of a spider's web, or watch a squirrel gather food. Praise the Creator.

Being in nature heightens our awareness of God's presence. It's a great place to practice the discipline of solitude.
