New Year's is a time of new beginnings. It's a time of year that causes us to pause and to reflect, to reevaluate and reassess our lives. Who are we? Why do we exist? What's really most important in life? What goals and priorities really matter? In other words, it's a time when we seek to define our purpose.

The same is the case in the life of the church. New Year's offers us a really great opportunity to stop and take a really good look at who we are, where we are, why we exist, and where really we're going.

Think of it like this: If you're going on a journey, you can't start driving without knowing where you are and where you're going. You have to know your current location. You have to know your destination, and you have to know how you're going to get there. The same is the case with the church. If we're to make an impact in our world, we have to know who we are, where we are going, and how we're going to get there. Otherwise, we'll be like a hamster exerting a lot of energy but not making any progress.

Over the last several years, the United Methodist Church has gone through a lot of upheaval. Some 348 churches left the UMC in the West Ohio Conference alone. That upheaval can leave us with a lot of uncertainty. Uncertainty about who we are. Uncertainty about what we stand for. Uncertainty about who where we are going and the like. And it's for that reason, that I'd like to begin this New Year by getting back to our United Methodist roots. The roots of the Wesleyan movement on which we were founded.

Think about the image of roots for a moment. In many ways, the roots are the most important part of the plant. They fix the plant firmly in the soil. They provide water and minerals. They are the life-source of the entire plant. Roots are absolutely vital to the overall health of the plant. The fact is what we see on the surface, above the ground, is directly connected to what is beneath the surface—to the roots.

To be concerned for the least of these? To empower people for ministry? And to make the mission front and center in all that we did?

My prayer and my challenge for this New Year is that we would reclaim our roots. That we would reclaim our identity and we might become the people God has already called us to be in this year.

#### Administrative Board Topics of Interest

1) In December, we approved the 2024 budget which is outlined in narrative form in this newsletter. We project an annual income of \$207,900 and expenses of \$223,701 for a net loss of \$15,801. As such, we will be doing a number of fundraisers and pushes to reduce our overall net loss by the end of the year. If you would like to be a part of our fundraising and marketing team, please let Pastor Justin know. We continue to ask for your prayerful and faithful financial support as we seek to impact our world! We believe our best days are ahead of us, but it requires faithfulness and sacrificial generosity from us all.

## 2023 Faith Based Financial Plan (Approved at December 11, 2023 Board Meeting)

I hope you share my excitement about the many worthwhile ministries taking place at Oak Hills UMC. One significant factor behind the fruitfulness of these ministries is your continued faithfulness to fund ministries through your generous financial support. Money itself is a lifeless thing, but when put to use by dedicated disciples who seek to do great things for God, great things can and will happen. As a part of our continued effort to improve communication, you will find here a narrative version of our 2024 faith-based financial plan (budget), which shows how your gifts will go to support the work of God at Oak Hills over the course of the next year. If you would like a line-item version of the budget, it is also available in the church office upon request. I look forward to seeing what God will do through us in the coming year!

Total Estimated 2024 Operating Expenses: \$223,701 (Reduced by \$6,375 from 2023 Budget).

## 1) <u>Team 1: Radical Hospitality: \$6,950</u> (Increased by \$50 from 2023 Budget)

1 John 4:7-8 says, "Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love." Love is the supreme virtue of the Christian life. We exist to love our neighbors as ourselves. The radical hospitality team focuses on loving the people of our community the way God loves them. This portion of the budget supports both our Sunday morning hospitality (cookies) and the outreach we do into the community whether that be through Sissy's Pantry, our community dinners, advertising, or simply offering gifts of appreciation to show teachers and first responders how much we really care. In addition, this portion of the budget includes our hobby based outreach groups and block parties.

## 2) Team 2: Passionate Worship: \$4,806 (Increased by \$844 from 2023 Budget)

Jesus calls us not only to love our neighbor as ourselves, but to love God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength (Mark 12:30). The primary way we love God is through worship. We were created for worship. Our worship services, both in person and online via Facebook and YouTube, help us to grow in our love for God. This portion of the budget covers our worship service, communion elements, music and licensing, decorations, banners, candles, and technology for media, sound, and streaming online.

## 3) <u>Team 3: Faith Forming Relationships: \$17,325</u> (Reduced by \$2,575 from 2023 Budget)

A disciple of Jesus Christ continually grows in their love for God and God's people. This happens as we spend time in the word of God and in relationship with others. That begins with our children and youth, and continues on into adulthood. In every phase of life, we learn to love more and more like Jesus. This portion of our

faith-based financial plan supports curriculum and supplies for all of our children's, youth, adult Sunday School, and small group ministries. It also supports Jesus and Me (JAM), Vacation Bible School (VBS), our puppet ministry, youth trips and outings, our family outreach events and movie nights. In addition, we are receiving a grant to create a space and launch a youth after school program.

## 4) <u>Team 4: Risk Taking Missions: \$1,500</u> (Reduced by \$500 from 2023 Budget)

From the beginning of his ministry, Jesus called his disciples to follow him and to fish for people. As we spend time with Jesus, he sends us back out to be involved in his mission in the world. This happens through our risk taking missions team. While most of our mission endeavors are supported by special donations (Operation Christmas Child, Helping Hands Gifts Cards), we did budget some money to assist with our charitable projects in the schools-to provide for food and other hygiene needs in the schools.

#### 5) Pastor and Staff Salary and Benefits: \$123,291 (Increased by \$8,158 from 2023 Budget)

We employ a full time pastor, a part time youth pastor, and a part time church secretary. This portion of the faith-based financial plan represents their salaries, reimbursable expenses for ministry, housing allowance, continuing education, pension, health insurance, workers compensation, and taxes. This increase includes a \$2000 raise in salary for Pastor Justin adopted at the 2023 Church Conference.

6) **Property and Utilities: \$50,540** (Reduced by \$14,540 from 2023 Budget)

Oak Hills UMC owns a church and one old parsonage (the Bridgetown house). We are currently in the process of cleaning the Bridgetown house in preparation to rent it out. This portion of the church budget includes our utilities, property taxes, insurance, maintenance, lawn care, landscaping, and snow removal. We budgeted to begin renting out the Bridgetown house in April 2024. Should it take longer, our monthly income will be reduced by \$1000 a month and we will have additional utility expenses. A good chunk of the reduction in costs comes from the sale of the Ebeneezer parsonage in 2023. We also still have some reserves available from the sale of the Ebeneezer parsonage for unexpected repairs.

## 7) Office, Administration, and Finance: **\$13,436** (Reduced by \$539 from 2023 Budget)

The church office, administration, and finance teams provide the necessary support for the pastor, the staff, and the ministries of the church to thrive. This portion of the budget includes regular office expenses including supplies, copies, postage, bulletins, newsletters, equipment, our website, background checks, our annual stewardship campaign, giv-

#### 8) Connectional Giving: \$5,853 (Increased by \$2,300 from 2023 Budget)

As United Methodists, we are part of a larger work of Christ through district, conference, national, and global ministries and missions of the church. Through connectional giving, we support the ministries of local, national, and global missions, United Methodist colleges, universities, seminaries, hospitals, and homes, and provide for new church starts and congregational revitalization, among other things. This portion of our budget includes paying 100% of our district apportionments and \$2000 of our conference apportionments for 2024, as well as hotel expenses for our lay delegate to annual conference. While we desire to pay our apportionments in full, we do not have the funds to do so. But, we did want to show some growth from 2023 due to our ongoing dependence on grants from the district and the conference.

Total Estimated 2024 Income: \$207,900 (Reduced by \$14,950 from 2023 Budget)

Total anticipated income includes \$152,400 from tithes, offerings, and seasonal offerings, \$40,500 from designated giving, \$23,000 in grants from the Great Miami River District and West Ohio Conference, \$9,000 in rental fees from the Bridgetown house and \$2,000 from room use fees and fundraisers. The \$23,000 in grants, include a grant for youth and family ministry for \$10,000, an outreach grant that includes our panty ministry, our community dinners, and our ministry with the local schools for \$7,000, and a \$5000 grant from the conference to create a space and launch an after school ministry. We are also planning to apply for another \$1000 for a summer youth mission trip or camp later in the year.

This projected budget results in a net loss of \$15,801. As such, we wil be doing a number of fundraisers and pushes (such as our recent wampum for the website) to reduce our net loss by the end of the year. If you would like to be a part of our fundraising and marketing team, please let Pastor Justin know. We believe our best days are ahead of us, but it requires faithfulness and sacrificial generosity from us all.

With winter weather around the corner, we wanted to take time to let you know what to expect. In general, Pastor Justin will do everything possible NOT to cancel worship. If worship must be canceled it will be announced on channel 5, our church Facebook page, and our church website on Sunday morning no later than 8 a.m. Pastor will still stream the sermon live provided he has internet service at home.

In general, you can expect the following:

(1) Level 3 Snow Emergency (in Hamilton County): All in person worship services, church activities, and meetings will be canceled and the church office will be closed. Worship online will still proceed as scheduled provided that Pastor Justin has internet service at home.

(2) Level 2 Snow Emergency (in Hamilton County): All in person church activities and meetings will be canceled. Pastor Justin and Mary Flannery will determine whether inperson worship services are canceled on a case-by-case basis. If in person worship is canceled, worship online will still proceed as scheduled provided that Pastor Justin has worship at home. Pastor Justin and Beverly Boone will determine if the church office is closed on a case-by-case basis and may work from home if needed. Each person is encouraged to use their own wisdom and discernment to determine if they will go out.

(3) Level 1 Snow Emergency (in Hamilton County): All inperson worship services, church activities, and meetings will proceed as scheduled provided Pastor Justin can get to church. The church office will be open. Each person is encouraged to use their own wisdom and discernment to determine if they go out.
