Pastor Article - Mother's Day

One day 4 scholars were talking about the Bible. The subject of the debate: Which Bible translation is the best? The first liked the King James Version (KJV) because of the beauty and eloquence of its language. The second liked the New American Standard Bible (NASB), because of its accuracy and faithfulness in translation. The third was sold on the New International Version (NIV), because it captured the ancient meaning in a way that was easily understood by the modern reader. Finally, after a few minutes, the fourth one spoke up and said, "I have personally preferred my mother's translation to the rest." He, then, went on to explain how his mom had translated each and every page of the Bible into her daily life. Her life, her teaching, and her example were the most convincing translation he had ever seen. It was because of his mom that he had been molded and shaped into the person that he was today. How true! Through word and deed, many a mother has done a lot of preaching to their children over the years. It may not have been from a pulpit or in any formal capacity, but it was lived out every single day.

I'm reminded of Susanna Wesley, the mother of John and Charles Wesley. Susanna was a faith filled woman. She is said to have prayed for one hour every single day for each one of her 10 children. She was a strict woman, but was unselfishly faithful. She had six general rules for teaching her kids about Jesus: (1) Subdue selfwill in the child. (2) Teach him to pray as soon as he can speak. (3) Give her nothing she cries for, and only what is good when she asks politely. (4) Punish no fault confessed, but let no sinful act go unnoticed. (5) Reward good behavior. And (6) strictly honor every promise you made. In addition, she is said to have taken each child aside for a full hour every week to discuss spiritual matters. It's no wonder that John and Charles went on to become the founders of Methodism in America. Faith mattered to their mother deeply and because of it they saw it lived out and practiced every single day.

Thomas Edison once said: "I did not have my mother long, but she cast over me an influence which has lasted all my life. The good effects of her early training I can never lose. If it had not been for her, I should never likely have become an inventor. ... My mother was the making of me!"

The godly heritage invested in us by our mothers is the foundation upon which our faith is built. The lessons we learn from our mothers are some of the greatest and most lasting lessons in life. In 2 Timothy 1:5 Paul recalls the sincere faith, which first lived in Timothy's grandmother Lois and in his mother Eunice, calling him to "fan into flame the gift of God"—that good deposit that they invested in him.

I would challenge you do the same this month. Take time to remember the godly legacy that your mom, your grandma, your spiritual mother, or some other motherly figure who invested in you over the years.

Allow that to inspire you to keep investing in your kids, your grandkids, and the other kids of our church today. You never know the difference it will make. Looking back, Susanna likely never expected she'd still be impacting countless generations of Methodists today all because of her investment in her kids.


And yet, one day in heaven, she will see all of the people who were impacted through her investment!

Administrative Board Topics of Interest

- 1) We are working to put together a brief (1 minute) video showcasing the various ministries of our church for promotion via our website, church Facebook page, and other Facebook groups. If you have any recent (last few years) pictures or brief (10 seconds or less) videos that we could use in this work. please submit those to Pastor Justin in the church office at oakhillsumc@fuse.net.
- 2) Sissy's pantry could use some help during the week to move donations downstairs and sort them in preparation for pantry time on Wed. We are also in need of assistance switching out our clothing from winter to summer selections. Please see Barb McLaughlin, Bob Schloss, or Sue Schloss if you can
- 3) Giving for March was strong. We brought in \$37,228 in revenue and spent only \$18,457, resulting in a profit of \$18,992 for the month. Of that, \$7,625 came from grant income. We also had a large one time gift from an unexpected donor. Thank you! That brings our first quarter to a net gain of \$14,028 for the year. That is well ahead of the loss of \$5,102 that we had at the end of the first quarter last year. Our average year to date monthly revenue stands at \$23,270 and our average monthly expenses at \$18,594.
- 4) The trustees have elected to move our maintenance contract from Cintas to Dave Zuber for our emergency lighting, exit lights, and fire extinguishers. This brings us savings of nearly \$1,600 a year.
- 5) The trustees are currently taking estimates on replacing the siding for the rental property to repair damage that was caused from squirrels getting inside it. Depending on the estimates, the trustees will determine how to proceed; either to replace all the siding or to simply patch the places that need fixed.
- 6) The trustees believe the leak in the lobby is not an issue with the roof, but the flashing at the window. Once it gets warm enough and dry enough, Anthony Smith will be caulking the window to stop the leak.
- 7) By the time this newsletter is published, the café will be finished and open for hospitality. Once it is completed, we will have a brief service of dedication and prayer over the space following worship.
- 8) Our risk taking missions team is identifying groups to appreciate once every quarter.
- 9) Our last bake sale fundraiser brought in \$157 and the Bob Evans Fundraiser around \$60




Fresh Air Promo
